1. Release Description

NXP Semiconductors is pleased to announce the release of the S32 Design Studio for Power Architecture 2.1 for NXP Automotive Power Architecture®-based MCUs. S32 Design Studio is based on the Eclipse open development platform and integrates the Eclipse IDE, GNU Compiler Collection (GCC), GNU Debugger (GDB), and other software to offer designers a straightforward development tool with no code-size limitations.

6. Installation and Licensing

The installation package contains the complete S32 Design Studio for Power Architecture 2.1 suite and the installer. All data needed by the installer is included in the package and no other download will be performed.

Note: The plug-ins to support third-party compilers or debuggers such as Lauterbach Trace32[®] are not included in the installation package and have to be installed from the corresponding sites or installation packages. If your computer is connected to the Internet, select **Install New Software** on the **Help** menu to find and install all available plug-ins. If your computer does not have access to the Internet, you can download and install them from the archive files.

Run the installer. The wizard will guide you through the installation process.

Note: Installation of S32 Design Studio for Power Architecture 2.1 from the command line interface in the console or silent mode is not supported.

During installation, license activation is requested. The following activation types are supported:

- Online activation requires access to the Internet. A license activation request is sent automatically.
- Offline activation requires no Internet access. A license activation request is generated and needs to be passed to the licensing site manually. The activation response is loaded from the site to the installer manually.

New functionality can be added to S32 Design Studio for Power Architecture 2.1 with updates and patches. Updates and patches extend general functionality of the product and correct software defects. If your computer is connected to the Internet, select S32DS Extensions and Updates on the Help menu to find and install all updates and packages available. If your computer does not have access to the Internet, you can download software packages, updates, and patches from the product page and install them from the archive files using the S32DS Extensions and Updates tool.

Appendix A. Known issues and Workarounds

Note: There are some issues which are introduced by Eclipse CDT and are therefore reproduced in the S32 Design Studio. These issues might be fixed when the fix is available in the future version of Eclipse CDT and the S32 Design Studio migrates to the updated CDT.

Conditional watchpoints and breakpoints: Conditional breakpoints and watchpoints, including those using ignore counts, may not work in some cases.

Workaround: Avoid using conditions for breakpoints and watchpoints, instead check for condition in the code and set a normal breakpoint.

Disassembly view content might be destroyed occasionally.

Workaround: Close the Disassembly view and open it again by selecting **Window** > **Show View** > **Disassembly** on the menu.

Hyperlinks may not work correctly on Windows 10 when Microsoft Edge is configured as the default browser.

Workaround: Set a different browser as the default one.

Views are not updated instantly after executing a command in the GDB console.

Workaround: Use the step command to see refreshed views.

The **Getting Started** page may be displayed blank in Linux.

Workaround: Install Webkit1 for GTK2 using the following command: sudo apt-get install libwebkitgtk-1.0-0

The **Getting Started** page may fail to load content at startup of S32 Design Studio for Power Architecture 2.1. "The page can't be displayed" error message may be shown instead.

Workaround: Refresh the **Getting Started** page by pressing the F5 key.

Debugging an elf file generated by the GHS compiler may not work correctly: missing call stack information, incorrect info on step into function, etc.

Workaround: In case of GHS generates the GDB incompatible debug information, it prevents the debugger displaying the call stack. Sometimes gdb can still debug your program without this information. The post-build step should be executed: open the project properties, click C/C++ **Build** > **Settings** and select the **Build Steps** tab, then add the following command: qstrip r=.debug_frame. Switch to Instruction Stepping Mode to be able to step through function. If this workaround does not help – please report issue to the GreenHills support.

- Debugging from flash fails for the multi-core project with GHS compiler and attached SDK: The GHS compiler defines the TURN_ON_CPU1 (TURN_ON_CPU2) macros for the boot core ASM files.
 - Workaround: Open the boot core project properties, click C/C++ Build > Settings, select the flash configuration and open the Build Steps tab. Then add the following post-build command: \${cross_prefix}objcopy -R .cpu1_reset_vector -R .cpu2_reset_vector \${ProjName}.elf.
- **Duplicated Content type and Language** in the Language Mappings settings: When adding new language mapping in the project properties (C/C++ General > Language Mappings) or global preferences (C/C++ > Language Mappings), the Content type and Language dropdown lists can display duplicated values.
 - **Workaround**: Select any option from the lists, all options are valid.
- Creating new project in the root of drive C:\ fails: When creating a new project in the root directory, the project wizard shows the "Can't create directory: C:\project_name" error message. Windows does not allow user to create files in this location.
 - **Workaround**: Create a subdirectory in the root directory (for example, C:\projects) and specify this location in the project creation wizard.
- Building project after generating the PEx code may fail: The build process can be run in parallel with the PEx code generating. The missing source files cause build fail.
 - **Workaround**: Make sure that generating the PEx code is finished: open the **Progress** view (**Window** > **Show View** > **Other...** > **General** > **Progress**), wait until the generating is complete and build the project again.
- Debug and runtime issues with the multi-core device project with attached S32 SDK for Power Architecture: When creating a new project for multi-core device and disabling some secondary cores, the SDK still defines the TURN_ON_CPUx macros, where x stands for the unused core. The device behavior is not defined and might lead to unexpected results.
 - Workaround: Open the boot core project properties, click C/C++ Build > Settings and remove TURN_ON_CPUx for unused cores from the Defined symbols lists on the following pages:
 Standard S32DS C/C++ Compiler > Preprocessor, Standard S32DS Assembler > Symbols.
- **Unable to start a new GDB server session** after the S32DS for Power Architecture is not responding: When IDE is not responding and the running process must be stopped using Task Manager, the GDB server process is not killed and prevents starting a new session.
 - Workaround: Open Task Manager and stop the pegdbserver_power_console process.

Appendix B. Performance Considerations

The following suggestions will help you keep the S32 Design Studio tools running at a respectable performance level.

1. To maximize the performance, the S32 Design Studio tools should be installed on a computer with the recommended configuration. While the tools will operate on a computer with the operational

- minimum configuration, limited hardware will restrict its ability to function at desired performance levels.
- 2. Close unused projects. Eclipse caches files for all open projects in the workspace. If you need multiple projects open, try to limit the number of projects to no more than 10.
- 3. The Eclipse IDE provides several options that provide user assistance tools. These options, however, use memory and CPU resources. If the performance is slow, and you do not need these options, turn them off.
- 4. Scalability mode options configure how Eclipse deals with large source files and may affect the overall performance of the IDE. Turn off these options to maximize the performance. The following scalability mode options are available: editor live parsing, semantic highlighting, syntax coloring, parsing–based content assist proposals, and content assist auto activation.

To disable:

- a. Choose **Window** > **Preferences**
- b. Expand C/C++ > Editor > Scalability
- c. Uncheck Enable all scalability mode options
- 5. Content Assist Auto Activation can reduce the number of keystrokes one must type to create the code. The Content Assist plug-in consists of components that predict what keystroke you may type next, based on the current context, scope and prefix. Turn off this predictor to maximize the performance.

To disable:

- a. Choose **Window** > **Preferences**
- b. Expand C/C++ > Editor > Content Assist
- c. Uncheck all the options for Auto-Activation
